CHAPTER NINE

1957 DEFINITIVE ISSUE.

To provide a united face for the newly-formed Federation to the outside world, stamps and postal stationery in a unified series of designs were quickly prepared in the form of the 1948 "Malaya Key Type" definitive series. In a world where most countries now had pictorial issues to display their assets and culture, these issues, based on the 1935 Straits Settlements design, were not ideal. It was therefore decided to produce a new series of pictorial designs. For key postal rates, stamps and postal stationery were to be issued on a national basis. In addition, each state would have a comprehensive range of stamps to cover the other rates. All the designs would incorporate "MALAYA" in accordance with the Malayan Postal Union agreement, which required this inscription to ensure mutual recognition of postage stamps and postal stationery between the signatories (Singapore and the states of the Federation).

Initially, a series of hand-painted essays for possible designs were produced by De La Rue, similar in size to the 1948 series, but with "photographic quality" portraits of the respective sultans or coat of arms in a more modern frame incorporating elephant tusks either side of the portrait. These essays were 1c. Johore, 2c. Kedah, 3c. Kelantan, 4c. Negri Sembilan, 5c. Pahang, 6c. Perak, 8c. Perlis, 15c. Selangor, 20c. Trengganu. Strangely, Malacca and Penang were omitted.¹

Subsequently, a series of pictorial designs were produced. These were eventually adopted and all the stamps in the initial release were covered by Crown Agents Requisition G9/4850, which was divided into no fewer than thirteen parts.

1. FEDERAL DEFINITIVE STAMPS.

5 May 1957.



Design:

Designed by De La Rue staff artists, the issue comprised three values 36mm x 25mm and one (the 30c.) 25mm x 35mm. The 6c. value "Tapping Rubber" depicted a man wearing a songkok (hat) (in the background) and a woman wearing a sarong (in the foreground) tapping rubber, taken from separate photographs supplied by Yong Peng Seong Studios, Kuala Lumpur. The 12c. showed the Armorial Ensigns of the Federation of Malaya (coat of arms). This coat of arms design was originally intended, and artwork prepared, for a 10c. national stamp (the Tiger design was originally intended for the 12c.). The 25c. "Tin Dredge" shows a tin mine floating bucket dredge of the then-latest type (from a photograph by J. H. Giles). The 30c. shows a map of the Federation which omits in error the large islands of Pulau Langkawi and Pulau Tioman, an error which was never corrected and which was carried over to the 30c. aerogramme.

The four designs were submitted to the Crown Agents Inspector of Stamps in 19 July 1956. The 6c. and 12c. were approved immediately. The rejected 25c. design had an orange-yellow border and "25c" in large characters in the centre of its panel without a Jawi equivalent and was rejected. The 30c. was also rejected. The 25c. was resubmitted on 25 July 1956 with the addition of the Jawi value. The revised design was approved on 16 August 1956 but the colour was rejected. An alternative version with the final blue border had already been submitted on 7 August 1956 and this was approved on 4 September 1956. The 30c was resubmitted on toned paper on 11 September 1956 but again rejected on 13 September 1956. A version with Sumatra and Thailand shaded in to clarify which part of the map was Malaya was submitted on 27 September 1956 and the revised design gained approval on 9 October 1956.

Printing:

Printed in sheets of 50 (10 x 5 (except 30c.) or 5 x 10 (30c.)) by De La Rue, this issue was notable as an early example of the use of more than one printing method on a single stamp. On the 6c and 25c. stamps, the centre was printed by intaglio ("Direct Printing" in DLR terminology) and the frame by lithography. The reverse was true on the 12c., whilst the 30c. was printed by intaglio only. Printing colours varied between reprints and are listed later.

6c.: The three 150-set bi-metal lithographic printing plates were produced using 50-set glass multipositive images, which were in turn based on 50-set glass negative and 1-set glass positive, film positive and glass negative photographic images. The intaglio plate was produced using an original vignette die and a common transfer roller for the 6c. vignette, the 25c. vignette and the 12c. border. Vignette plate 2 was produced almost immediately, presumably due to damage to the original plate. According to the Plate and Die Register, there was never a vignette plate 3 (presumably, it contained a defect and was never put to press). Plate 4 was registered on 26 June 1959 and plate 5 on 14 June 1959. Plate 6 was used but is not recorded in the Register.

12c.: The four 150-set bi-metal lithographic printing plates were produced using 50-set glass multipositive images, which were, in turn, based on 4-set positive and 1-set positive and negative photographic images. The intaglio plate

was produced using an original border duty die and the common transfer roller. There were no replacement intaglio plates.

25c.: The three 150-set bi-metal lithographic printing plates were produced using 50-set glass multipositive images, which were in turn based on 1-set glass positive and negative photographic images. The intaglio plate was produced using an original vignette die and the common transfer roller. There were no replacement intaglio plates.

30c.: The two 100-set intaglio plates were produced using original vignette and border dies and a 2-set transfer roller (vignette + border). A duplicate set of plates was produced (Plate 2).

Sheet markings:

The printer's imprint "Thomas De La Rue & Company Limited, London" appears in the centre of the bottom sheet margin (below stamps R5/5 and R5/6) on 6c., 12c. and 25c. sheets or "THOMAS DE LA RUE & COMPANY, LIMITED" (in smaller type) below R10/3 on 30c. sheets.

The plate numbers were towards the right of the bottom margin. In the case of the 6c., 12c. and 25c. two numbers appeared under each of R5/9 and R5/10 (three under R5/10 in the case of the 12c. and the later 10A printing of the 6c.). On the 30c., the lake (border) plate number appeared below R10/4 and the orange (vignette) plate number below R10/5.

The printer's plates contained three panes of stamps. The litho plates appear to have generally been renewed for each new printing, but there were exceptions. The various known plate numbers were used as shown below. Combinations in italics must have existed, but have not yet been recorded. Plate numbering seems inconsistent, sometimes appearing to follow on from the previous plate of the same colour and sometimes from the last highest number used. Additional combinations may have existed to fill the gaps in the plate numbering.

Other sheet markings include a "T" at the bottom right of the 30c. 1A pane as a perforating guide, with a single pin perforation at the junction. After the change of perforator, the guide cross was changed by addition of a dot at the cross of the T with a circle below it, in the centre of which the perforator guide pin was registered.

On the 25c., two almost-superimposed guide crosses appear below the M of COMPANY, with a perforation hole through the centre of one.

Paper:

These original printings were on ordinary paper without ultra-violet reaction. It has been stated that chalk surface paper was introduced on the 30c from Reqn. G9/5757/1 released on 20 June 1961, but the present author has seen no evidence to support this. However, De La Rue introduced a new paper from circa 1961 with a small amount of fluorescent optical brightening agent (OBA), giving a low blue fluorescence under ultra-violet light. This has been positively identified on the 30c. and might exist on the 6c. and 25c., but it must be borne in mind that different paper stock was used for landscape and portrait-format stamps. Care must be taken with used copies to avoid confusion due to migration of OBA from envelopes during the soaking process, which was usually patchy.

Watermark:


The paper was manufactured with the Multiple St. Edward's Crown Block CA watermark upright. The 6c. exists with inverted watermark. 99 examples (probably from a single sheet) were found used on reply postcards used in February 1965 in conjunction with wedding invitations by a prominent Kedah family. ⁶

Perforations:

The 6c., 12c and 25c. stamps were printed with comb perforation 13.2 x 12.8, with each pane perforated separately. Sheets of the 6c. were perforated right to left, leaving the right margin imperforate and single extension holes in the top and bottom margins and the left margin perforated through. A right hand side marginal strip of five 6c. was found at GPO Penang in 1959-1960 with an additional strike of the perforator offset about 10mm to the right at a slight angle to the normal. ⁹ A 3B 2B 2B 4B block has been seen perforated from the back of the stamp, instead of the normal practice of perforating from the front. A very late 6c. printing (grey 10A) is known with right margin perforated through indicating perforating in the opposite direction.

Sheets of the 12c. and 25c. were perforated left to right, leaving the left margin imperforate, single extension holes in top and bottom margins and the right margin perforated through.

The 30c. was initially comb perforated upwards from the foot of the sheet by a comb with a single extension pin at left and right. The bottom margin was therefore imperforate and the side margins imperforate except for the extension hole. This perforator has an anomaly in that the top five pins at each side measured 11.8, suggesting that a redundant perforator was modified for use on this issue by extending the "teeth" of each comb by five pins. It might therefore be more accurate to describe it as $12.8 \times 12.8 \times$

From the February 1961 printing (Reqn. G9/5757/1), the 30c. used the same 12.8 x 13.2 comb perforation hitherto used for the other values, but not the same perforating head as, in this version, the bottom margin was imperforate and the right margin perforated through, indicating that either the head had no extension holes and went side to side or it spanned the printer's sheet starting from the bottom (for a more detailed discussion of perforators, see the state issues below).

Requisition History:

There were subsequently a considerable number of printings, some of which can be identified by changes. It should be noted that, as a result of the Crown Agents Stamp Bureau policy of exchanging old stock for newly-printed material, the stamps shipped to Malaya for a given requisition were a mix of old and new material. Printings were released in London by Crown Agents on the dates shown (but not all printings were so released):

1. Reqn. G9/4850/2 (1956) (Initial printing).

Crown Agents Requisition 4850/2 (4850/1 was an order for Trengganu) called for 483,000 sheets (24.15 million stamps) of the 6c., 31,800 sheets of the 12c., 181,800 sheets of the 25c. and 221,800 sheets of the 30c. They were to be parcelled in packs of 500 sheets.

For the initial printing, the date on which the plates were released by the Crown Agents Inspector of Stamps to the printers appears to have gone unrecorded. Considering the size of the order under Requisition 4850/2, it was unsurprising that the stamps were shipped in several batches as follows:

The Crown Agents Stamp Bureau took 3000 sheets of the 6c. stamp and 1800 sheets of the other values. The quantities shipped to Malaya were 434,450 sheets (6c.), 32,972 sheets (12c.), 183,600 sheets (25c.) and 194,190 sheets (30c.). Notes: Initial issue of all values. Released as a new issue on 5 May 1957. 6c. reported as deep blue, red yellow and grey-blue.

2. Reqn. G9/806/1 (1958).

Reprint without inspection of 18,000 12c. sheets, parcelled in 500s, to be shipped by 1 October 1958. "without inspection" means that the Crown Agents Inspector of Stamps was to be by-passed, as it was a straight-forward reprint. The exact order was shipped in two batches on 5 November 1958 and 2 December 1958, of which 40,975 stamps (819¹/₂ sheets) were stock from the original printing which had been exchanged by the Crown Agents Stamp Bureau for newly-printed stamps.

Notes: 12c. only. Released on 9 December 1958.

3. Reqn. G9/1440/1 (1958).

Reprint without inspection of 200,000 6c. sheets, parcelled in 500s, to be shipped commencing in January 1959 (and paid for after 1 January 1959). The exact order was shipped in two batches on 4 March 1959 and 8 June 1959, of which 1800 sheets were stocks exchanged by the Bureau.

Notes: 6c. only. Released on 15 April 1959.

4. Reqn. G9/3083/1 (1959).

Reprint without inspection of 100,000 sheets of 6c. and 40,000 sheets of 25c., parcelled in 500s. After the Bureau had exchanged 98170 6c. and 40520 25c. stamps, 104963 sheets of 6c. and 40560 sheets of 25c. were shipped on 19 October 1959 (part 6c.), 5 November 1959 (part 25c.), 19 November 1959 (balance of 6c.) and 16 February 1960 (balance of 25c.).

Notes: 6c., 25c. Released on 17 February 1960.

5. Reqn. G9/5751/1 (1960).

Reprint without inspection of 300,000 sheets of 6c., 10,000 sheets of 12c., 80,000 sheets of 25c. and 90,000 sheets of 30c., parcelled in 500s, to be shipped by the end of October 1960 and to be paid for during 1960. After the Bureau had exchanged 1900 6c. sheets and 800 sheets of the other values, the exact ordered quantities were shipped on 14 December 1960 (part 25c.), 8 February 1961 (part 30c.), 3 March 1961 (part 6c. and 12c., and balance of 25c.), 15 June 1961 (balance of 12c.), 1 August 1961 (balance of 30c.) and 13 September 1961 (balance of 6c.).

Notes: All values. Released on 20 June 1961. 6c. reported as changed to indigo, red yellow and grey-blue. Perforation change on 30c.

6. Reqn. G9/7496/1 (1961).

Reprint without inspection of 220,000 sheets of 6c., 90,000 sheets of 25c. and 82,000 sheets of 30c., parcelled in 500s. The Bureau exchanged 1900 6c. sheets and 800 sheets of each of the other values. A total of 232,896 6c., 89,754 25c. and 83,229 30c. sheets were shipped on 29 November 1961 (part 6c.), 23 March 1962 (part 25c.), 2 April 1962 (part 30c. and balance of 6c. and 25c.), and 8 May 1962 (balance of 30c.).

Notes: 6c. released on 23 January 1962. 25c. and 30c. released on 10 July 1962.

7. Reqn. G9/82/1 (1962).

Reprint without inspection of 79,880 sheets of 6c., parcelled in 500s. After the Bureau had exchanged 94,826 stamps and taken 1880 sheets for its own purposes, 73,277 sheets were shipped in two batches on 28 November 1962 and 4 January 1963.

Notes: 6c. only. Released on 12 February 1963. Colour reported as indigo, red yellow and slate-blue.

8. Reqn. G9/134/1 (1962).

Reprint without inspection of 200,000 sheets of 6c., 80,000 sheets of 25c. and 135,000 sheets of 30c., parcelled in 500s. Delivery was as follows:

6c.: 189,940 sheets on 1 May 1963 and 30 August 1963. The Bureau exchanged 1880 sheets.

25c.: 77,764 sheets on 21 August 1963 and 30 August 1963. The Bureau exchanged 780 sheets.

30c.: 117,210 sheets on 1 May 1963 and 17 September 1963. The Bureau took 300, and exchanged 460, sheets.

Notes: 6c. released on 27 August 1963. 25c. released on 10 September 1963. 30c. (on low OBA paper) was released on 15 July 1963.

9. Reqn. G9/Malaya/196/1 (March 1964?).

Reprint without inspection of 242,000 sheets of 6c., parcelled in 500s. Delivery of 235,576 sheets took place on 3 June 1964 and 21 October 1964. The Bureau exchanged 3600 sheets. Notes: 6c. only. Released on 21 July 1964.

10. Reqn. G&P/Malaya/4/42455/1 (July 1964?).

Reprint without inspection of 524,300 sheets of 6c., parcelled in 500s. Delivery of 488,190 sheets took place on 9 December 1964 and 5 January 1965. The Bureau took 500 sheets. Notes: No known CA release.

11. Reqn. G&P/Malaya/4/42455/2 (July 1964?).

This was a combined order for 3000 sheets of 6c. plus assorted state stamps. Instead of printing new stock, this order was met from unsold Bureau stocks. The Bureau supplied the order by surface on 9 July 1964. Notes: No CA release - old stock.

Destruction of plates and dies:

All the plates, dies, transfer rollers and photographic master images were destroyed on 30 December 1965.

2. STATE DEFINITIVE STAMPS.

In addition to the four Federal values already described, eleven stamps were planned to be issued for each of the eleven states of the Federation. The designs were the responsibility of De La Rue, which also printed the stamps for the duration of the issue (1957-1965). Johore's requisition was cancelled at the insistence of Sultan Sir Ibrahim, who was understood to have objected to a number of features of the design, notably the use of a tiger on the principal 10c. letter rate value, which he felt gave a wrong impression of modern Malaya. The other ten states decided to go it alone and Johore retained the 1948 Definitive Issue stamps until 1960 when Sultan Sir Ibrahim died and his son authorised printing of Johore's stamps.

The stamps of this issue were normally on sale only in the state inscribed on the stamp plus the various philatelic bureau in Malaya and at the General Post Office in Singapore.

Development of the designs:

The eleven designs, of which three (10c., 20c., 50c.) are 25mm x 35mm and the rest 35mm x 25mm, are said to have been based on picture postcards, one from and representing each state. The consensus as to which states is noted below, although no official list is known.

The original drawings were produced by De La Rue artists at approximately five times stamp size, then a master die was engraved for each value, from which the state versions were developed. Sample Jawi text was supplied by the Federal authorities to avoid mistakes, but some proofs still had to be corrected. The \$2 Malacca QE2 stamp contains a design error in that the Jawi text for "Dollar" in the right-hand value table should have three dots in the form of a triangle towards the right hand end, but the left hand dot was omitted. It was corrected on the 1960 new issue.

1c. "Copra" (black):

Harvesting copra on a beach by splitting coconuts. Copra is the meat of the coconut, used to provide oil for soap making. The fibrous outer husk is known as coir and was used for weaving of mats and other similar objects. This was said to represent Malacca. The master die proof, without state name, was submitted to the Crown Agents Inspector of Stamps in black on 3 September 1956 but rejected on 19 September. It was resubmitted on 1 October with the detailed engraving of the design generally better defined, and was



approved on 15 October. Stateless "Colour" proofs were submitted, still in black, on 26 November and approved on 12 December. The Kedah, Malacca, Negri Sembilan, Pahang, Penang, Perak and Selangor proofs were approved on 21 March 1957. Kelantan, Perlis and Trengganu were submitted on 3 April and approved on 10 April.

2c. "Pineapples" (orange-red):

Harvesting pineapples. This was said to represent Johore, where the original photographs were taken. The master die proof, without state name, was submitted in black on 3 August 1956 but rejected on 4 September. It was resubmitted on 1 October with the line of the background detail which was level with the top of the farmer's head filled in, whereas before it was only lightly shaded, and approved on 15 October. Colour proofs were submitted in two colours ('A' orange-red or 'B' red-orange) on 26 November and 'A'

was approved on 12 December. The Negri Sembilan design was resubmitted on 28 January 1957. The Kedah, Kelantan, Malacca, Pahang, Penang, Perak, Perlis and Selangor proofs were approved on 30 January. The Trengganu proofs were submitted on 22 February and approved on 25 February. On 1 March, the Secretary to the Keeper of the Rulers' Seal recommended that the left hand end of the Trengganu Jawi text should be made sharper, but, as the design had already been approved, no change was made. Two shades "orange-red" and a more-yellow "red-orange" exist for some states.

4c. "Ploughing rice" (sepia):

Ploughing rice padi with water buffalo. This was said to represent Kedah, where the original photograph was taken. The master die proof was submitted in black on 7 August 1956 but rejected on 4 September. It was resubmitted in two colours ('A' dark chocolate brown or 'B' sepia) without apparent change on 26 November and 'B' was approved on 12 December. The Kedah, Kelantan, Malacca, Negri Sembilan, Pahang, Penang, Perak, Perlis and Selangor proofs were submitted on 28 January 1957 and approved on

6 February. The Trengganu proofs were submitted on 25 February and approved on 28 February. The early printings to circa 1959 had a warmer "sepia-brown" shade, but by 1961, a darker "sepia" shade had become standard.

5c. "Mosque" (carmine-lake):

Masjid Alwi (Alwi Mosque), Kangar, Perlis. The master die proof was submitted in black on 7 August 1956 but rejected on 4 September. It was resubmitted in two colours ('A' carmine-lake or 'B' bright red) without apparent change on 26 November and 'A' was approved on 12 December. The Kedah, Negri Sembilan, Perak and Selangor proofs were approved on 21 March 1957. Perlis and Trengganu were submitted on 3 April and approved on 10 April. Kelantan, Malacca, Pahang and Penang were then submitted on 10 April and approved two days later.

8c. "East Coast Railway" (myrtle-green):

This double-headed Malayan Railway express passenger train was officially stated to depict the Sumitan Emas (Golden Blowpipe) express train that was introduced on the East Coast Railway in 1954 twice-weekly between the junction with the West Coast main line at Gemas in Negri Sembilan and Tumpat in Kelantan. This design was said to represent Negri Sembilan.

However, the train actually shown was the special train which carried General Sir

Gerald Templer when he reopened the war-damaged East Coast Railway in July 1953. The original photograph was posed at Gua Musang (Kelantan) on the return run. The leading locomotive was Malayan Railway Class O⁴ 4-6-2 Pacific 564.12 "CORONATION", piloting 564.04, both built in 1946 by the North British Locomotive Co. Ltd. 564.12 was named on 2 June 1953 when it hauled the first train out of Kuala Lumpur on Coronation Day. They were later additionally named "ALOR GAJAH" and "PADANG TERAP" respectively and were the first oil-fired locomotives (and the first air-conditioned train) to visit the line.

The master die proof was submitted in black on 3 August 1956 but rejected on 4 September. It was resubmitted in two colours ('A' myrtle green or 'B' lighter bright green) without apparent change on 26 November and 'A' was approved on 12 December. The Negri Sembilan design was submitted on 28 January 1957. The Kedah, Kelantan, Malacca, Pahang, Penang, Perak, Perlis and Selangor proofs were approved on 30 January. The Trengganu proofs were submitted on 8 March and approved on 12 March.

10c. "Tiger" (deep brown, later changed to deep maroon):

Tiger (Harimau Belang, *panthera tigris*). This value was based on artwork by Mr. A. R. Lane, based in turn on a photograph by Lt.-Col. A. Locke. It was the choice of this design for the basic letter rate which most upset the Sultan of Johore, who considered that the Federation should promote a more modern image instead of tiger-infested jungle. Said to represent Trengganu, it was originally intended that this design would be used for a 12c. state stamp (artwork, altered in blue pen to 10c., for the 12c. Negri Sembilan has entered the public domain). The Pahang, Penang, Perak, Perlis, Selangor and Trengganu proofs were submitted in black on 8 August 1956 but rejected on 4 September. The design of the tiger was heavily redrawn, the new design showing the top of the tiger's legs. The redrawn centre was submitted on 19 November and



approved on 30 November. The head oval may also have been slightly reduced in size. Two versions for Malacca in different colours were submitted on 31 December. The Kedah, Negri Sembilan, Penang and Selangor colour proofs were approved on 5 March 1957. Pahang and Perak were submitted on 4 March and approved on 7 March. Kelantan, Perlis and Trengganu were submitted on 5 March and approved on 7 March.

20c. "Fishing craft" (blue):

The fishing prau was a local type of sailing boat, also sometimes spelt as prahu. This was said to represent Penang, but the photograph was believed to have been taken off the coast of Trengganu. The original photograph showed a boat with the sail only partly raised. This was altered on the stamp design to show the boat in full sail. The artist fully raised the sail and altered its angle giving the false impression that the boat was travelling backwards. In order to avoid perpetuating this question, the steersman was omitted from the design but the oar was not removed, spoiling the effect! The master die proof without a man at the tiller was submitted in black on 3 August 1956 but rejected on 4 September. It was resubmitted on 1 October with the

steersman re-inserted and the Jawi character for 5 redrawn heavier and better defined and approved on 15 October.¹⁴ Colour proofs were submitted in two colours ('A' darker navy blue or 'B' ultramarine) without apparent change on 26 November and 'B' was approved on 12 December. All states were submitted on 31 December. The Kedah, Kelantan, Malacca, Negri Sembilan, Pahang, Penang, Perak, Selangor and Trengganu proofs were approved on 2 January 1957. The Perlis proof was submitted on 4 January and approved on 23 January. The Johore stamp, when eventually issued, used in error the rejected design without the steersman (see under Reqn. G9/3103/2 (1959) below).

50c. "Aborigines with blowpipes" (black & bright blue):

This was said to represent Pahang, where the original photograph was taken. The master die proof was submitted with black frame and blue centre on 7 August 1956 but rejected on 4 September. It was resubmitted on 1 October with the inscription changed from "ABORIGINES" to "ABORIGINES WITH BLOWPIPES" and the background lightened. The revised design was approved on 15 October. Colour proofs were submitted in two colour combinations ('A' bright blue frame with black centre or 'B' ultramarine frame with black centre) without apparent change on 26 November and 'A' was approved on 12 December. Submission dates for the final proofs for all states are unknown. Two production shades - "Ultramarine" and "Blue" - are found, but it has not been possible to consistently assign them to particular printings.

\$1 "Government Offices" (ultramarine & reddish purple):

This was said to represent Selangor. It shows the Sultan Abdul Samad Building, Kuala Lumpur, built in 1884, the seat of administration of the Federation. The original photograph, taken before today's high rise development, nevertheless shows a large modern building in the background which was omitted on the stamp. The master die proof was submitted with black frame and blue centre on 3 August 1956 but rejected on

4 September. The centre design was resubmitted on 1 October with slight shading added at the top of the sky but again rejected. Colour proofs were submitted with two colour options ('A' with a purple-violet frame and darker blue centre or 'B' as issued) without apparent change on 26 November and 'B' was approved on 12 December. All states were resubmitted on 18 January 1957. The Trengganu proofs were again submitted on 28 January and approved 6 February. Some later printings were in a darker shade of purple than the original version.

\$2 "Bersilat" (bronze-green & scarlet):

This was said to represent Perak. Bersilat is a Malay form of Judo. Two players are shown in full Malayan national dress. The photograph contained a large audience, omitted on the stamp. The \$2 was originally intended to be portrait-format and an essay for the Malacca stamp existed in the De La Rue Archive. The landscape-format master die proof was submitted with black frame and blue centre on 3 August 1956 but rejected on 4 September. It was resubmitted on 1 October with the centre repositioned to eliminate a

white gap and allow the weaver's foot to appear in the design and approved on 15 October. Colour proofs were submitted with two centre colour options ('A' dark and 'B' light green) without apparent change on 26 November and 'B' was approved on 12 December. The Malacca, Negri Sembilan, Pahang, Penang, Perak and Selangor proofs were submitted on 21 March 1957 and approved on 25 March. Kedah was submitted on 25 March. Kelantan was submitted on 3 April and approved on 10 April. The Perlis and Trengganu proofs were also approved on 10 April.

\$5 "Weaving" (brown & bronze green):

This was said to represent Kelantan, but the original photograph (which included two looms, not one as shown on the stamp) was annotated "Trengganu". The master die proof was submitted with black frame and blue centre on 3 August 1956 but rejected on 4 September. It was resubmitted on 1 October with the Jawi character for 5 redrawn heavier and better defined and approved on 15 October. Colour proofs were submitted with two frame colour options ('A' dark and 'B' light green) without apparent change on

26 November and 'B' was approved on 12 December. Proofs of all states were resubmitted on 20 December, but the Jawi text for Negri Sembilan and Trengganu was incorrect. The corrected Trengganu proofs were submitted on 6 February 1957 and approved on 8 February. Some 1962 printings of the \$5 had a yellow olive shade frame.

In several cases, such as the 2c. and 50c., the rejected shades subsequently appeared on issued stamps, possibly in error.

State emblems:

The stamps of the different states each showed the portrait of the ruler of the state or a symbol representing the state. In several cases, these later changed. The original line-up was:

Johore's Sultan Sir Ibrahim was reported not to have approved of the designs, particularly the use of a tiger on the 10c. letter rate value, which he thought suggested that Malaya was still an underdeveloped, third world country covered in jungle and thus gave a wrong impression of modern Malaya. As the disagreement proved insoluble, the Johore requisition was cancelled before printing had commenced. The essays for the Johore issue were reported to have been displayed at a London exhibition. ¹⁵

The portrait of Queen Elizabeth II on the Penang and Malacca issues is a reminder that these issues were designed and the first values issued prior to the Federation of Malaya becoming independent of the United Kingdom, which occurred on 31 August 1957. This anachronism was corrected in 1960. The portrait used was a standard De La Rue profile engraving derived from Dorothy Wilding Ltd photograph 15924A. The portraits of the rulers were also taken from portraits, which were probably all taken at a single special sitting.

Essays & Proofs existing in the public domain:

A portrait-format composite stamp-sized essay (vermilion printed frame, bronze-green hand-painted centre) of the \$2 Malacca (QE2), affixed to thick card 73mm x 68mm, was offered at auction by SG in 1989.¹⁶. At the same auction, there was a printed 1c. Malacca (Tree) affixed to a card 56mm x 41mm (but perforated 13 all-round instead of 13 x 12¹/₂), and a 50c. Malacca (Tree) composite essay with hand-painted centre (as issued) on card 37mm x 50mm. An essay of the 10c. Johore exists in black with a full-face portrait of Sultan Sir Ibrahim and an unadopted state of the tiger vignette. This was offered in the July 2008 Spink Singapore auction together with proofs of the 10c. Kedah in blue, 10c. Malacca (QE2) in blue and brown, 5c. Pahang in deep blue, 5c. and 10c. Penang (QE2) in blue, 10c. Perak in blue and incomplete proofs of the tiger vignette in black. Another unadopted proof of the Johore head showed Sultan Sir Ibrahim in state dress instead of military uniform. Artwork has entered the public domain for landscape- and portrait - format1c. Negri Sembilan designs containing photographic essays of vignettes showing a "Malay House".

The De La Rue proof approval sheets containing samples of all the original 1957 issues (32 pages) were broken up and sold at auction in 2006.

Printing plates:

They were printed using intaglio (direct printing in DLR terminology) on a sheet-fed machine and released in counter sheets of $50 (10 \times 5 \text{ for } 10 \text{ c.}, 20 \text{ c.} \text{ and } 50 \text{ c.}, \text{ or } 5 \times 10 \text{ for the rest}).$

De La Rue tackled Requisition 4850 of 1956, this immense order for 121 individual stamps (reduced to 110 by the cancellation of the Johore issue), as a single project. Initially, for proofing purposes, one unhardened slip die was produced for each duty. The master dies for the approved designs were engraved in three parts, the head or emblem, the border without duty or state detail and the common vignette design for each value. Slip transfer rollers were then produced for each of these dies. As there would be considerable wear in creating the necessary multiple images from these rollers, each roller had several copies of the master die, for example the East Coast Railway roller had three images (3-set), while the Copra, Mosque and Tiger rollers are known to have been 4-set. The Pineapples vignette roller was 2-set, while both 2-set and 4-set versions of the Sailing Craft roller appeared in the Plate and Die Register.

The heads and borders were then combined, then, for the single-colour duties, the vignette was added to complete the design. Thus, for each state, an "original" single-working die for each of the seven single-colour values was produced.

For each of the four bi-colour duties, a common "original" vignette die was produced for use in all states, plus an "original" border duty die for each of the four values for each state.

From each of these "original" dies, a corresponding printing plate was made using transfer rollers. These rollers were usually 3-set with designs for more than one state and were retained for use should it be necessary to make new plate. Those recorded in the Plate and Die register were as follows:



\$5 Penang border * + \$5 Selangor border Images on the rollers marked "*" were destroyed ¹⁷ on 13 December 1961 (Malacca), 17 January 1962 (Penang), 13 March 1963 (Kelantan, Selangor), 2 March 1964 (Kedah \$5), 7 March 1964 (Kedah rest). The remainder were certified destroyed on 22 February 1966.

Initially, the single-colour values from 1c to 20c were printed from 150-set individual plates designated Plate 1 with three 50-stamp panes, marked 1A, 1B and 1C below stamp 49.



From knowledge of the relative sizes of the printer's sheet (18¹/₄ inches x 16 inches) and counter sheet (14⁷/₈ inches x $5^{7/8}$ inches), it can be concluded that the three panes were one above the other in the case of landscape-format stamps (side by side for portrait-format).

The bi-colour stamps shared common vignette plates, used for all states, with separate border plates. The 50c and \$1 were initially printed from 100-set plates designated Plate 1 with two panes marked 1A 1A and 1B 1B. The \$2 and \$5 were initially printed from a single-pane, 50-set plate designated Plate 1 and marked 1 1. On these bi-colour stamps, the numbers appeared under stamps 49 (frame colour) and 50 (vignette colour). Based on study of the marginal perforations of the high value stamps, and bearing in mid the need to minimise the number of different paper sizes held by the printer and make best use of press capacity, there is a strong likelihood that high value stamps for more than one state would have been printed simultaneously whenever possible.

The Crown Agents printing plate register states that Perlis low values were printed from 100-set two pane plates, instead of the 150-set used for the other states, but this was a clerical error as the 1C pane exists. It may have been that this was considered at an early stage but abandoned when it was realised that it would create increased complexity in paper stock (smaller sheets required), etc.

The Penang 4c. panes were initially numbered 1A 1B 1A in error. The real 1A plate has a gap between the number and the stamp frame of 5.25mm. The error has 5mm gap and a perforation guide cross below the imprint. This was corrected to 1A 1B 1C with effect from the first reprint, issued on 28 January 1959.

From 1958 onwards, in the cases of Kedah, Kelantan, Malacca, Penang and Selangor, new plates were produced as necessary where the Sultan or state emblem had to be changed. These remained or reverted to Plate 1.

The Pahang 50c. border plate 1 was replaced by border plate 2 in April 1960, its first use being on Reqn. G9/4525/4, shipped on 2 May and released by the Crown Agents on 17 May.

Selangor (Old Sultan) 10c. plate 1 was replaced by Plate 2 in late 1960, still 150-set but 2A-2C. It was only used to print Reqn. G9/5869/2 (the only maroon printing), shipped in two batches on 6 January and 2 June 1961 and released by the Crown Agents on 9 May.

The common 50c. vignette plate 1 was replaced by vignette plate 2 in August 1962. In the case of Pahang, this meant that sheets bore 2A 2A or 2B 2B instead of 1A 2A or 1B 2B shown on all other states. Printings using vignette plate 2 were released as follows:

Examination of Perlis printing from the two 50c. vignette plates suggest that Plate 2 has less-well-defined blowpipes and grass tufts in front of the men.

Selangor (New Sultan) 10c. plate 1 was replaced by Plate 2 in April 1964, still 150-set but 2A-2C. It was only used to print Reqn. G9/194/1, shipped in two batches on 28 April and 9 November 1964 and released by the Crown Agents on 14 July.

Other sheet markings:

The printer's imprint "Thomas De La Rue & Company Limited, London" appeared in the centre of the bottom sheet margin (below stamps R5/5 and R5/6), except on 10c., 20c. and 50c. where "THOMAS DE LA RUE & COMPANY, LIMITED" (in smaller type) appeared below R10/3.

A perforation guide cross, pierced by a single pin appeared at the centre of the top margin on the 1c. to 8c. 1C pane and the bottom of the 1A pane, confirming that the printer's sheet was perforated before guillotining. A guide cross also appeared, guillotined through, at the extreme bottom right of the 50c. 1A1A pane.

A large blue dot, guillotined through vertically, appeared in the extreme bottom right corner of the sheet of the Selangor 50c. from the 22 July 1963 release of pane 1A2A. It may also have appeared at the left of 1B2B.

Paper and Watermark:

The paper was normally non-fluorescent (ordinary) and, with the exception of the "New Sultan" issues of Kelantan and Selangor, had the Multiple St. Edward's Crown CA upright watermark. Because the portrait-format and landscape-format stamps were made up on plates of the same rectangular format, but with the portrait-format stamps positioned sideways, yet all the stamps had to have upright watermark, it follows that two different stocks of paper had to be held, as paper with watermark sideways was necessary to print the 10c., 20c. and 50c. sheets.

As with the Federal values, some printings from 1961 onwards show varying degrees of OBA, giving a lightly bluewhite fluorescent reaction under ultra-violet light, possibly accidental in origin. No consistent pattern has been observed, with printings alternating between ordinary and fluorescent paper. These UV differences are not strong and are best detected by comparison with normal stamps on a non-fluorescent background. Reports that reprints of the 50c., \$2 and \$5 from 1960 with revised perforations were be on chalk-surfaced paper cannot be substantiated, but glossier paper was used for later printings (see below).

In 1961-1962, the low value stamps of Kelantan and Selangor were re-issued with the heads of their new Sultans. The 10c. of Selangor was the first stamp to be issued with a new watermark, Multiple PTM, unique to Malaya, orientated upright. This watermark was used for these "New Sultan" low values, but did not appear on reprints of other stamps in the series. It was also used for a number of years for commemorative issues and for the 1965 Definitive Issue. The new paper, as used for this definitive issue, had a glossy finish, but a bottom marginal pair has been seen in which the gloss ceases some 10mm below the stamps leaving a matt finish.

The first order for this paper was supplied by William Howard under Requisition 7238/2 (Part of the Selangor order) which ordered 2 imperial tons of "white thick postage paper with Malaya PTM upright watermark in reels 37" x 18¾"". (The 37 inch dimension is assumed to have been the reel diameter.) This was to be supplied to Samuel Jones & Co. Ltd. at Peckham for gumming and cutting into printer's sheets 18¼ inches x 16 inches to produce approximately 256 reams (128,000 sheets). This was to be made up into parcels of 500 sheets bearing a buff label stating the contents and "PTM Upright Watermark", and delivered to the Crown Agents Inspector at De La Rue's Dufferin Street, London EC1 premises.

Reqn. G9/7238/3 ordered two more batches of paper from the same source in reels 18³/₄" x 37". The first was 1 ton 5 cwt of paper to give 160 reams (80,000 sheets) and the second 2 tons 10cwt to give 320 reams (160,000 sheets). The label was to show "PTM Upright Watermark" or "PTM Sideways Watermark" as appropriate.

Although the Requisition Book entry states "(for Kelantan and Selangor new issue stamps)", a quick estimate shows that this quantity of paper would have barely covered the Selangor issue and that similar paper orders probably appeared in every Requisition. Why this particular order was singled out for inclusion in the (stamp) Requisition Book is unclear.

Perforations:

There were at least three perforator heads used simultaneously throughout the life of this issue, but study of the sheet margins and direction of perforating across the sheet and from front or back suggests that the full story will be found to even more complex after further research, with more than one perforator of the same gauge in use following renewals circa 1959-1960. The perforated stamps measure:

Perf. A - Comb 13.2 x 12.8.

Used for all 1c., 2c., 4c., 5c., 8c. It was also used from 1960 for \$2, \$5 printings.

Notes: Each pane perforated separately, but possibly simultaneously. Only left margin perforated through. Single extension hole in top and bottom margins. Right margin imperforate. Perforator ("teeth" facing left) started from right of sheet and moved left. Stamps are normally perforated from the front, but examples of the Johore 1c., 5c., 8c., Kedah (New) 4c., Kelantan (Old) 4c., 5c., Kelantan (New) 5c., 8c., Malacca 5c., Negri Sembilan 1c., 4c.-5c., Pahang 5c., Penang 1c.-4c., Perak 1c., Selangor 4c., 5c., and Trengganu 1c., 4c.-5c.

clearly been perforated from behind. Dated copies seen come from various releases between 10 November 1959 and 8 September 1964, showing no clear pattern.

When applied to dollar values, this had to be a single pane perforator unless the printer arranged for the press to simultaneously print stamps from more than one state. As with the 1960 onwards printings with Perf. B below, there was evidence to suggest that the perforator was renewed at around that date resulting in the bottom margin being perforated through.

Perf. B - Comb 12.8 x 13.2.

Used for all 10c. and 20c. printings and, from 1960, for 50c. printings.

Notes: Initially, this was the same physical perforator as A, but applied to portrait-format sheets. The perforator normally started at the bottom of the sheet and worked upwards, leaving the bottom margin imperforate, perforating through the top margin and leaving a single extension hole in left and right margins. There may be examples of perforating in the reverse direction. Stamps are normally perforated from the front, but examples of the Johore 10c. and 20c., Kedah (New) 10c., 20c., Kelantan (New) 20c., Malacca 10c., Negri Sembilan 20c., Perak 10c., Perlis 10c. (both colours), Selangor (New) 10c. and Trengganu 10c. and 20c. exist that have clearly been perforated from the back. Dated copies come from releases between 24 February 1960 and 22 September 1964.

A new, longer, perforating head was introduced by March 1960 (being used on the World Refugee Year special issue) which spanned two panes and the inter-panneau gutter, with bottom margin imperforate, top perforated through and a single extension hole at the left of the left pane and right of the right pane. The 1964 Pahang 50c. was known with the top margin imperforate, suggesting reversed use.

Perf. C - Comb 12.8 x 12.8+11.8.

Used until 1960 for 50c. printings.

Notes: This was the compound perforator used for the 30c. Federal stamp. The perforator started at the bottom of the sheet and worked upwards. Although the 30c. perforator was only five stamps wide and thus only spanned one pane, Pahang 1A and Selangor 1A are reported perforated through the right margin with the bottom margin imperforate. This indicates that a wider perforator of the same gauge, similarly modified, also existed that could perforate both panes simultaneously, possibly 11 stamps wide.

Perf. D - Comb 13.7.

Used for all printings of the \$1.

Notes: Why a separate perforator should be consistently used for this one value is a mystery. Examples have been seen which suggest that the perforator started at the bottom of the sheet and worked upwards on some printings (with a single extension hole at the left and right) and from the left hand side on others. By March 1960, a perforator of this gauge existed that could span eleven landscape-format stamps of this size and thus span two panes (as used for the World refugee Year stamp). A Pahang printing dated 16 June 1964 was perforated from behind.

Perf. E - Comb 12.8+11.8 x 12.8.

Used until 1960 for \$2, \$5 printings.

Notes: This was the same physical perforator/perforators as Perf. C., but applied to landscape-format stamps. This had to be a single pane perforator unless the printer arranged for the press to simultaneously print stamps from more than one state. It was applied from the right to left, except for the 1959 Kedah (New) stamps, which were perforated left to right. The \$2 Malacca, Negri Sembilan and Trengganu are known perforated through the bottom margin using the extended head (see Perf. C).

Stamp coils:

De La Rue supplied a stamp vending machine to Malaya under Crown Agents Requisition G9/8047 circa 1957. Stamp coils (referred to in Crown Agents records variously as reels or rolls) were first produced for Malaya under a number of requisitions in 1961. The work was done by Harrison, who at this time was also doing similar work for Singapore. It was therefore not always clear from the Requisition book whether a "Malaya" entry refers to the Federation or Singapore. Requisition 8045/1 refers to Malaya, calling for dummy stamp reels to be produced from 200 sheets of blank paper perforated as a 50-set stamp pane. Ten reels of 1000 "stamps" per reel were shipped by parcel post on 10 July 1961. It is believed that these were for the Federation as the Federation used 1000 stamp reels (see below). However, companion Requisition 8045/2 for 25 reels of 500 plain paper "stamps" was clearly for Singapore in that it states "to fit machine for vending 10c. Singapore stamps. Join on long edge. If gummed, gummed side outermost".

Reqn. G9/6816/1 required Harrison to make-up and supply to Crown Agents Department G9 (contracts) a reel of 1000 Perak 10c. stamps plus 100 sheets of stamps. The stamps for this purpose were to be obtained from G10 (the Bureau).

For the production issues, De La Rue printed 10c. stamps specially for this purpose and supplied them to Harrison at High Wycombe who made them up into coils of 1000 stamps, joined at the narrow edge with the gummed side outermost and wrapped in Cellophane. One specimen of the first batch of each roll was supplied to CB. The stamps for production coils were supplied as follows:

Reqn. G9/84/1 was unusual in that it required DLR to perforate an unspecified quantity of plain, unwatermarked paper in 50 set as if it was the Malayan States 10c. stamp, then supply it via the Superintendent to Harrison to make up dummy stamp rolls. DLR supplied the material on 27 June 1962. Reqn. G9/84/2 was an instruction to Harrison to make up this paper into dummy stamp reels of 1000 "stamps". 24 reels were sent on 28 September 1962. They were labelled "Malaya dummy 10c stamp reels", wrapped in Cellophane and marked "Req.G9/Mal Fed Post 84/2".

In 1965, a dealer advertised coil strips of five 10c stamps of Johore, Pahang, Negri Sembilan and Selangor, which were ordinary sheet stamps linked by margin from another issue.¹⁸ As Pahang never ordered coils, and the margin from a different issue was used, this sounds suspicious.

It has been confirmed that a machine was installed in Johore Bahru which used coils assembled using vertical strips torn from sheets, removing the bottom margin but retaining about 6mm of the top margin to stick the strips together, which was what would be expected of officially-produced coils.¹⁹ The whereabouts of the other machines in other states have not been established.

Requisition history:

There were no less than 181 Requisitions for new supplies of stamps over the 8 year period during which this issue was on sale. Details of these orders with, where known, the dates on which new printings were shipped to Malaya and released in London by the Crown Agents Stamp Bureau are shown below. Requisitions are listed in the sequence of first shipment.

Quantities ordered and delivered are shown against each requisition. It should be noted that each state ordered a quantity appropriate to its anticipated need and that Johore's initial order was placed but never printed. Orders were shipped in up to three batches depending on the urgency and the size of the order. Dates prefixed A indicate airmail shipment, AF Air Freight, IPP Insured Parcel Post or PP Parcel Post. In all other cases, ordinary sea freight should be assumed. Noteworthy was the high proportion of some values retained at the Bureau, more than 50% in the case of many 1c. stamps, which were popular with dealers for making up packets of stamps for general collectors.

Unless otherwise stated, the cent values were to be parcelled to GPO Specification 383 in parcels of 500 sheets, with the dollar values in parcels of 100 sheets. In the case of Johore, the 50c. was normally packed in 100s, as for dollar values.

All the stamps in the initial release were covered by Crown Agents Requisitions 4850/3 (Johore) 4850/4 (Kedah), 4850/5 (Kelantan), 4850/6 (Malacca), 4850/7 (Negri Sembilan), 4850/8 (Pahang), 4850/9 (Penang), 4850/10 (Perak), 4850/11 (Perlis) 4850/12 (Selangor), 4850/13 (Trengganu) in 1956.

For the initial printing, the plates were released by the Crown Agents Inspector of Stamps to the printers on the following dates. The scale of the printing job can be appreciated when you see that the first plates were released in January 1957 and the last in July 1957, but printing was not completed until July 1958. Dates for return of the plates

after completion of the print run were not recorded. In the table below, for the bi-colour stamps, B = Border, V = Vignette. Vignette plates were common to all the states and thus released only once, before the border in each case.

This Requisition was an urgent "no inspection" order. The design for the new head was approved on 16 September 1958. The 10c. brown was approved on 30 September 1958. Specimens of each value were supplied as follows: GPO 385, PP 59, CA 2, CB 1, BM 1, CI 1, CL 1 and MH 1.

A common portrait die was engraved and a transfer roller used to transfer the design into the seven dies for the single colour stamps and the border dies for the four bi-colour stamps. Five 2-set or 3-set transfer rollers were used to transfer the designs to the printing plates: 1c. + 5c., 2c. + 4c. + 4c., 8c. + \$1 border, 10c. + 20c., 50c. border + \$2 border + \$5 border. Eleven printing plates were produced with the same settings as the original issue. The bi-colour stamps used the normal production vignettes.

On the new issues of Malacca and Penang released on 15 March 1960 and all subsequent printings, the colour of the 10c. was changed from deep brown to deep maroon to enhance the difference in colour between the 4c and the 10c. In the case of Selangor, this colour change coincided with the introduction of new Plate 2 of the original ("Old") design.

24. Reqn. G9/3215/1 (1959) Penang (3):

The Penang and Malacca issues originally both bore the portrait of Queen Elizabeth II. Following independence, it was decided to change the emblem on both to replace the Queen's head by a symbol more representative of the independent state. In the case of Penang, this was the coat of arms which had been adopted in 1949. This was surmounted by the Pinang or Areca-nut palm (*areca catechu*).



This Requisition was a "no inspection" order for the complete set of values. Specimens of each value were supplied to GPO 390 plus 6, PP 60, CA 2, CB 1, BM 1, II 1, CO 3, MH 1 and HM.

The 20c., 50c., \$1, \$2, \$5 design proofs were submitted and approved on 28 July 1959. The 10c. deep brown was also submitted but rejected. There was a concern that the colour of the 10c. was too similar to that used for the 4c. A series of shade trials followed culminating in approval of a deep maroon shade on 15 September 1959. This colour was subsequently used for all new 10c. printings. The 1c., 4c., 5c. and 8c. were approved on 18 August 1959 followed by the 2c. on 30 September 1959.

The Penang and Malacca (see entry 29) requisitions were worked on simultaneously. Three transfer rollers were made up from the old dies with the heads and titles erased. These were based on the old Malacca 2c. + 4c. + 5c., Malacca 8c. + 10c. + 20c. and Malacca 1c. + Penang 20c. From these, for both states, new single-working dies were produced for 1c. to 20c. and border dies for 50c. to \$5. A new original vignette die was also produced for each state and transferred to the border dies using a separate 4-set transfer roller for each state. Twelve transfer rollers were then used to make up plates: Malacca 1c. + 2c., Malacca 1c. + Penang 20c., Malacca 4c. + Malacca 5c. + Penang 4c., Malacca 8c. + Penang 2c., Malacca 10c. + 10c., Malacca 20c. + 20c., Malacca 50c. + \$2 border, Malacca \$1 border + \$5 border, Penang 1c. + 1c., Penang 5c. + 8c., Penang 10c. + 20c., Penang 50c. border + 50c. border, Penang \$1 border + \$2 border + \$5 border. The plate formats (150-set, 100-set or 50-set) were as used for the original issue.

The Malacca and Penang issues originally both bore the portrait of Queen Elizabeth II. Following independence, it was decided to change the emblem on both to replace the Queen's head by a symbol more representative of the independent state. In the case of Malacca, this was supposed to be the Melaka tree (*Nypa fruticans*), but looking more like a British oak, and a mouse deer. The mouse deer (*Tragulus javanicus*) is also known as the Pelandok or Chevrotain.



This Requisition was a "no inspection" order, the details of which are shown in the table

below. Specimens of each value were to be supplied to GPO 390 plus 6, PP 60, CA 2, CB 1, BM 1, II 1, CO 3, MH 1 and HM.

The Malacca and Penang (see entry 24) requisitions were worked on simultaneously and full details can be found under the Penang entry.

Johore was the last state to adopt the 1957 definitive series, because of the dispute with Sultan Sir Ibrahim. After that Sultan's death in 1959, Sultan Ismail quickly approved their release with his portrait, and this Requisition was issued. The artwork was granted design approval on 20 February 1960.

A common portrait die was engraved and a 4-set transfer roller used to transfer the design into the seven dies for the single colour stamps and the border dies for the four bi-colour stamps. Six 2-set transfer rollers were used to transfer the designs to the printing plates: 1c. + 4c., 2c. + 20c., 5c. + 8c., 10c. + 10c., 50c. border + \$1 border, \$2 border + \$5 border. Eleven printing plates were produced with the same settings as the original issue. The bi-colour stamps used the normal production vignettes.

First to appear was the 10c., the value Sultan Sir Ibrahim had most objected to, on 10 June 1960. In consequence of the delay, this issue reflected from the start changes made in production since the original 1957 printings.

Notable was the change of the 10c. from deep brown to deep maroon. Numerically, this was the first Requisition to use maroon, but the Malacca and Penang issues were printed and issued first. All subsequent 10c. printings are in deep maroon.

When the design for the Johore 20c. was produced in June 1960, the rejected design of 3 August 1956 was used in error, resulting in omission of the steersman.²²

In its usual spirit of difference, Johore normally specified that 50c. stamps should be treated as high values and packed in bundles of 100 sheets, whereas other states treated the 50c. as a low value and had it packed in 500s.

Specimens were ordered for GPO (408+6), PP (100), CA (1), CB (1), BM (1), CommI (1), CO (3), MH (1) and HM. Sheets were ordered and shipped as shown. In most cases the number of sheets shipped was not recorded.

The Minister for Works, Posts & Telecommunications announced on 8 October 1960 at the opening of the 8th Selangor Stamp Club exhibition that future high value definitive issues from 50c. upwards would be issued on a Federal, rather than state, basis. A subsequent press release announced eight new national stamps and seven new state stamps to be released over a five year period to ensure continuing interest in Malayan stamps during the five years. In the event, they all emerged in 1965.

In accordance with the new policy, when, in 1961-1962, the low value stamps of Kelantan and Selangor were reissued with the heads of their new Sultans, the high values were not re-issued. However, reprints of the higher values continued to be produced from the existing plates until the Birds high value definitives appeared in 1965. These "New Sultan" low values used the new Multiple PTM watermark (see notes on Watermarks in Chapter 3), but standard Crown Agents paper continued to be used for all other printings.

Following the death of Sultan Ibrahim in 1960, his portrait was replaced by that of Sultan Yahya Petra, but only on low value stamps in accordance with the October 1960 statement of policy. This Requisition ordered the necessary stamps. Proofs of the revised designs had to be submitted to the Inspector of Stamps. He rejected the new head design on 19 April 1961. However, "in view of the urgency", the Sultan was consulted directly and he approved it over the head of the Inspector of Stamps on 24 April 1961. It is not known if proofs of the finished stamps were ever submitted for approval.

The dies and plates were ordered under 6829/1 of 1961. Two transfer rollers (1c. + 2c. + 4c. + 5c., 8c. + 10c. + 20c.) were made from the original Kelantan dies with the heads removed. From these, seven new single working dies were produced. A common portrait die was engraved

and a transfer roller used to transfer the head design into the new dies. Five 2-set transfer rollers were used to transfer the designs to the printing plates: 1c. + 2c., 4c. + 8c., 5c. + 5c., 10c. + 20c. A 1c. + 1c. roller was also produced. Seven 150-set printing plates were produced.

The stamps were ordered under 6829/2 of 1961, to be supplied without inspection. Specimens were supplied to GPO (414+6), PP (300 including 3 for CO), CA (1), CB (1), BM (1), CI (1), CRO Library (1), MH (1), HM (2), Contractor (2).

Proofs of the revised designs were submitted and the new head design was approved on 14 April 1961. The 2c. and 10c. were approved on 21 June 1961. On the same day, the 20c. in bright blue was rejected. It was resubmitted on 28 June 1961

in a darker shade and approved. The 1c. was approved on 26 June 1961, when the 4c. was rejected as "too light". The design was retouched deeper and approved 28 June 1961. The proof was compared with the original 6 February 1957 approved proof and was subsequently annotated "shows more chocolate brown - not grey-brown colour". The 5c. was also rejected with the note "sky too heavy". It was subsequently approved on 28 June 1961 with very slight lightening at the top. The 8c. was approved on 28 June 1961, together with the re-submissions as noted above.

Three transfer rollers had the heads erased (set 1c. + 2c. + 4c. + 5c., 1c. + 4c. + 5c. + 8c., 10c. + 20c.). From these, new single-working dies were made for each value. Two-set transfer rollers (1c. + 2c., 4c. + 5c., 8c. + 20c., 10c. + 10c.) were then used to make up new 150-set single-working plates for each value.

UPU specimen stamps were not overprinted or perforated. A 2c. Penang (QE2) has been seen overprinted "SPECIMEN" horizontally with bars above and below. The 5c. of the same series has been seen with the same overprint applied vertically. The status of these items has not been established. ³³

First day facilities:

There was no known official first day cover, but many private covers were issued by local printers. Issue dates are listed under the respective Requisitions below.

Withdrawal:

All Kedah (Old) values were withdrawn from post offices at close of business on 30 June 1959 and invalidated for postal use from start of business on 1 January 1965.

All Malacca (QE2) and Penang (QE2) values were withdrawn at close of business on 14 March 1960 and invalidated from start of business on 1 October 1965.

The Selangor (Old) 10c. was withdrawn at close of business on 31 October 1961 on issue of the new Sultan's stamps. Similarly, the Kelantan (Old) 10c. was withdrawn at close of business on 1 December 1961. The remaining superseded values of both these series (1c., 2c., 4c., 5c., 8c., 20c.) were withdrawn at close of business on 28 February 1962. All 14 stamps were invalidated from start of business on 1 September 1967.

All other values were withdrawn at close of business on 10 September 1965 (50c. - \$5) or 16 November 1965 (rest) and invalidated from start of business on 1 November 1972.

3. THE POSTAL STATIONERY.

The stamp issue was complemented by postal stationery using the new designs:

3.1. POSTCARDS.

4 November 1957.

6c. Postcard (English).



Reqn. G9/5575/1 (1956?) requested De La Rue to supply one million 6 cent postcards, " $3\frac{1}{4}$ inches x $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches", banded in tens, bundled in 250s and packed in 2000s, plus 370 additional "specimens" for distribution by the Crown Agents. The first half million was to be in Malaya by 30 June 1957. The order was cut to 500,000 on 29 January 1957 but the full quantity was later reinstated.

The card was printed by De La Rue using three-colour lithography using 12-set plates (one for each colour), created using glass positive and negative originals.

The design of the 6c Federal definitive stamp was reproduced (32mm x 22mm), without simulated "perforations", in full colour on an ordinary white 140mm x 82mm postcard, giving only a very low blue-white fluorescent reaction), together with text in the blue used for the "stamp" reading "POST (coat of arms of the Federation) CARD / THE ADDRESS ONLY TO BE WRITTEN ON THIS SIDE.".

The proof was approved by the Crown Agents Inspector of Stamps, D. Wills, on 20 February 1957. A total of 1,089,500 were shipped in two batches on 21 May 1957 and 28 June 1957. A UPU Specimen exists date-stamped 3 December 1957 by the receiving postal authority.

Following independence, the Malay language was given precedence. The proof of a postcard with the arms at the top left and a revised text in Malay reading "POSKAD / TULIS 'ALAMAT SAHAJA DI SINI" was approved by the Crown Agents Inspector of Stamps, R. Ferne, on 19 October 1961. This proof was referenced "Requisition 7520/2", but this requisition did not contain an order for postcards.

Requisition history:

1. Reqn. G9/7520/3 (1961?).

A new consignment of "printing materials" was specially ordered by CA from De La Rue under Reqn. G9/7520/3 "New Printing Material for 6 cts. Malayan Postcards" and placed in store "To be held by Superintendent Stamp & Note Control Branch until an order is placed". This package comprised three lithographic master positives and matching contact negatives (one for each colour), from which new 12-set working plates would be made.

2. Reqn. G9/63/1 (1961?).

85,000 cards, packed as before, were ordered from De La Rue. 101,500 were shipped in two batches on 22 August 1962 and 9 October 1962. Specimens were produced to illustrate the Malay wording, allocated GPO 420 + 6, CA 1, CB 1, CO 1 and DLR 2. The card was printed on white card giving a moderate blue-white fluorescent reaction. The size of the card was essentially unchanged (an example measured 139mm x 83mm).

3. Reqn. G9/77/2 (1962?).

A further batch of 200,000 cards, packed as before, was ordered and 222,500 were shipped by DLR in conjunction with Crown Agents Department S3 on 11 April 1963. Unusually, this entry in the Requisition Book again specifies that materials would be issued by and must be returned to the Superintendent of the Stamp & Note Control Branch.

First day facilities:

There was no new issue facility for this card. Its issue date has not been determined.

Postal rate change:

On 16th November 1964, the postal rate for postcards rose from 6c. to 10c. The Malay text postcard was most common used after this date, with a pair of 2c. stamps of the appropriate state affixed. The consistency of this uprating, and previous Malayan practice, suggests that this was carried out by the counter clerk before the card was sold, in accordance with a standing instruction. Usually, the 1965 definitive issue stamps are seen, but similar use of 1957 definitive issue stamps. must have occurred in the year before the new stamps appeared on 15 November 1965.

Reqn. G9/5575/3 (1956?) requested De La Rue to supply 300,000 10c. envelopes, banded in 25s with waxed paper interleaving and packed in 250s, plus 370 additional "specimens" for CI.

10c. Envelope.

Official Envelope.

The original design was photographed and a master negative produced, together with a contact print. From this negative, a 12-set lithographic printing plate was produced. All this material was destroyed on 7 May 1965.

A total of 349,750 envelopes were supplied in two batches on 12 July 1957 and 5 September 1957. So far as is known, there were no reprints. A UPU Specimen was known date-stamped 3 December 1957 by the receiving postal authority.

The design, based on the 10c. State definitive stamp, was printed in brown on a 135mm x 108mm plain cream, wove paper envelope with pointed flap. The text on the "stamp" bore the words "FEDERATION OF" at the top in place of "MALAYA", which was, in turn, moved to the bottom in place of the state name.

Essay:

An essay of the 10c. design in sage green on thin, surfaced card was offered for sale by Spink in July 2008.

First day facilities:

There was no new issue facility for this envelope.

Postal rate increase:

The postal rate for internal letters rose from 10c. to 15c. on 16 November 1964. Any remaining stocks of 10c. envelopes would have been updated at or before the point of sale by the addition of a 5c. stamp. (An unused envelope has been recorded carrying a 5c. Malacca (Tree) stamp.

The 10c. envelope was overprinted for official use. Although previously reported as taking place in 1960, this was unlikely to have happened until after the replacement 15c. envelope (see Chapter 14) was released on 1 April 1967. Three horizontal bars, 1mm thick and 4mm apart, obliterated the "stamp" and "URUSAN POS" (Malay for "On Postal Service") in serif characters to the left of the stamp. Examples are known used, undated, by the Postmaster in Malacca and Penang ³⁵, and another at Kuala Lumpur by Pengawal Pos (Postal Guard) Selangor on 17 May 1971. ³⁶

These envelopes were printed by De La Rue and the printer's inscription appears under the flap. The design of the 30c. Federal definitive stamp was reproduced in bright blue on a pale cream envelope, reinforced on the inside with a mesh of linen threads, in four sizes (G: 152mm x 95mm, H: 205mm x 127mm, H2: 229mm x 102mm, K: 292mm x 152mm, sold at 40c., 45c., 45c., 60c respectively ³⁷). Actual dimensions vary due to variability in folding, etc. The "stamp" was enclosed by an additional frame (23.5mm x 37mm) with "REGISTRATION 20 CENTS" at the top and "POSTAGE 10 CENTS" at the foot. Each envelope has a narrow blue cross on front and back. The stamp was towards the top of the flap. The flap has a straight central edge with curved sides and seals to the right-hand end of the front. At the top left of the front was a box enclosing the words (in upper and lower case, amended as appropriate for the size of envelope) "This space is reserved for / Official Registration Label / G size envelope", normally obscured on used examples.

Towards the top, spanning the vertical blue line was the following text "REGISTERED LETTER / THIS LETTER MUST BE HANDED TO AN OFFICER / OF THE POST OFFICE TO BE REGISTERED AND A / RECEIPT OBTAINED." "TO" and one dotted address line appears above the horizontal line with three more dotted lines below. The text on the back was arranged in portrait format with, at the top, "NAME AND ADDRESS OF SENDER / FROM" and four dotted lines.

Requisition history:

1. Reqn. G9/5575/2 (1956?).

This requested De La Rue to supply one million Size G envelopes, 110,000 Size H envelopes, 52,000 Size H2 envelopes and 20,000 Size K envelopes, interleaved with waxed paper, banded in 25s and packed in 250s (except Size G which was to be banded in 25s, bundled in 250s and packed in 500s), plus 370 Size G "specimens" for the Crown Agents. The face value was to be 20c. registration plus 10c. postage. The order was cut to 500,000 Size G, 50,000 Size H, 20,000 Size H2 and 5000 Size K on 29 January 1957, but the original quantities were later reinstated.

The original design for each size was photographed and four glass negatives produced, together with a glass positive image of each. From these, a 4-set (size G) or 3-set (rest) lithographic printing plate was produced for each size. All this material was destroyed on 7 May 1965.

2. Reqn. G9/3079/1 (1959).

The first reprint order required De La Rue to ship, and invoice before 1 December 1959, 400,000 Size G envelopes, interleaved with waxed paper, banded in 25s, bundled in 250s and packed in 500s, without "specimens". 405,000 envelopes were shipped in two batches on 29 October 1959 and 11 March 1960.

Notes: Used copies believed to be from this printing show a darker blue on a slightly more cream paper.

3. Reqn. G9/5750/1 (1960).

The Sizes G, H2 and K envelopes, ordered under Requisition 5750/1, were designated, for unknown reasons, "Kuwait Style New". The order called on De La Rue to supply 650,000 Size G, 20,000 Size H2 and 5,500 Size K, interleaved with waxed paper and banded in 25s, bundled in 250s and packed in 500s. There were 386 Size G Specimens for use plus six for reference were supplied to the GPO, plus one each of Sizes G, H2 and K for CA, CB and DLR.

Proofs for this printing, produced by De La Rue in dark blue on cream in Sizes G, H2 and K with the printer's imprint under the flap, were approved by the Inspector of Stamps, D. Wills, on 18 August 1960. The printing was shipped (with quantities as ordered) on 2 November 1960 (Size K), 18 November 1960 (part of Size G and part of Size H2), 28 November (balance of Size H2) and 2 June 1961 (balance of Size G). The Size K envelope has "<u>FEE PAID</u>" at bottom left, which was absent on earlier printings and on other sizes of envelope.

Notes: In late 1960, the Sizes G, H2 and K envelopes appeared on sale in a duller shade of blue on deep cream paper. Shades vary within the printing. The earliest reported use for one of these envelopes were a Size G on 23 February 1961 ³⁸ and Size H on 6 November 1962. Used examples of Sizes H2 and K have not been reported. A Size K proof exists in the British Library Philatelic Collection.

4. Reqn. G9/6257/1 (1960).

This was for 14,000 Size H2 and 14,000 Size K envelopes, still priced at 30c., interleaved with waxed paper, banded in 25s and bundled in 25os. This order was cancelled.

5. Reqn. G9/6257/2 (9 December 1960).

The cancelled order was replaced by one dated 9 December 1960. This called for 14,000 each of Sizes H2 and K 30c. envelopes in "Kuwait Style", packed as in Reqn. G9/6257/1, with specimens of each for CA (1) and CB (1).

Both were shipped on 19 April 1961. No quantity was recorded for Size H2, but 14,250 was shown against Size K. It can fairly safely be assumed that 14,250 of each value were supplied.

6. Reqn. G9/6874/1 (1960?).

This was for 30c. Size H envelopes in "Kuwait Style", packed as in Reqn. G9/6257/1, with specimens of each for CA (1) and CB (1). It was shipped on 19 April 1961 at the same date as Reqn. G9/6257/2. The Requisition Book (erroneously?) records the order as being for 20,000. 2,100 was shown as being shipped. Notes: Size H on the new dark cream paper appeared in April 1961.

7. Reqn. G9/7520/1 (1961?).

The last English language requisition required 460,000 Size G, interleaved with waxed paper and banded in 25s, bundled in 250s and packed in 500s, plus 23,000 Size H and 14,000 Size H2, interleaved with waxed paper and banded in 25s and packed in 25os.

These were shipped as follows: 17 August 1961 (24,250 Size H), 1 September 1961 (part of Size G order), 13 September 1961 (14,500 Size H2), 14 March 1962 (balance of 486,400 Size G).

Reqn. G9/63/1 (1961?).

This called for 250,000 Size G Kuwait Style envelopes, packed as before, but with the text in Malay. Specimens were required to illustrate the Malay wording, allocated to GPO 420 + 6, CA 1, CB 1, CO 1 and the printer, DLR 2.

Proofs of Size G, H, H2 and K envelopes with De La Rue's printer's inscription under the flap and with the text completely replaced by Malay were approved by R. Ferne on 23 January 1962. The reproduction of the 30c stamp was reduced in size (17mm x 25mm) to accommodate two lines of Malay text above (Pendaftaran / 20 sen) and below (Bayaran Pos 10 sen) in the same size rectangle (23mm x 38mm).

268,500 envelopes were shipped in two batches on 11 July 1962 and 26 September 1962.

Notes: Proofs exist in the British Library Philatelic Collection. Although large quantities of the envelopes were shipped, there was no indication that this design was actually issued (possibly as result of the change in postal rates), as no mint or used examples have been seen or reported to the author. The sale price was unchanged.

In April 1963, De La Rue again lost the contract for Malayan registration envelopes to McCorquodale. A new design in the standard McCorquodale format (as used for 1947 Definitive Issue Type C) was introduced showing the Malayan coat of arms instead of the Map of Malaya. Although ordered by the Federation of Malaya, they were not printed, and thus did not come into use, until after Malaysia had come into being.

It had been thought that, although inscribed with the Malay name for the Federation of Malaya on the "stamp", this new series of envelopes did not replace the map series until an increase in the registration fee from 20c. to 40c. on 16 November 1964. However, copies are known to exist used from 27 July 1964 onwards and earlier usage may exist. This suggests that the registration fee was raised at an earlier, unrecorded, date. The envelopes were now sold at 60c. (G), 65c. (H, H2), 80c. (K) ⁴¹.

Design:

By an unknown designer, the envelopes would have been sold at a small premium over face value, increasing with envelope size. There was no printer's imprint. The crest was embossed in bright blue and the inscriptions are printed by letterpress in deep blue on early printings, later printings being in blue. The envelope was landscape-format. They are printed on cream linen reinforced paper. The paper gives no ultra-violet reaction. There was no watermark.

As with other contemporary printings of postal stationery, it was printed in Malay, with text as used on the 1962 proof above but rearranged. Instead of the map of Malaya, the "stamp" had the coat of arms of the Federation and the inscription "PENDAFTARAN 40 SEN BAYARAN POS 10 SEN" above "PERSEKUTUAN TANAH MELAYU". These were enclosed by a circular border, the wavy outer edge of which had a series of curved and straight edge segments. The box for the registration label was inscribed "Ruangan Ini di-khaskan / untok Lebel Pendaftaran / Rasmi. / Sampul surat G.". The front was headed "SURAT BERDAFTAR / SURAT INI HENDAK-LAH DI-SERAHKAN KAPADA / PEGAWAI PEJABAT POS UNTOK DI-DAFTARKAN / DAN AMBIL RESIT DARIPADA-NYA." above "KAPADA" and four lines for delivery address. The back reads NAMA DAN 'ALAMAT PENGIRIM" above "DARIPADA" and four lines for sender's address.

Requisition History:

1. Regn. G9/140/2 (17 April 1963).

This order was placed on 17 April 1963, very optimistically for delivery by end-April 1963. This required 500,000 Size G, 3,000 Size H2 and 9,000 Size K, banded in 25s with waxed paper interleaving between each envelope, bundled in 250s and parcelled in 500s in the case of Size G or banded in 25s and parcelled in 250s for the rest. The requisition specifies "Kuwait-style", the use of Malaya text and the introduction of a new stamp design for which reason four proofs were required before printing. 431 Specimens were required for GPO (427), CA (1), CB (1), CO (1) and the printer (1). The order originally specified a 30c. face value, but a revision to the order was made to reflect the change in face value. This was a Free-on-Board order to be shipped in conjunction with CA Dept. S3. The die proof of the "stamp" was approved by R. Ferne on 22 May 1963 and the Size G, H2 and K proofs were approved by D. Broughton on 10 July 1963. 513,444 Size G, 3444 Size H2 and 9443 Size K were inspected by the British Post Office and shipped on 15 November 1963.

Earliest possible release would be late 1963/early 1964. Earliest known used was 27 July 1964. ISC also Notes: listed size H as RE1a, there was no record of any order for such a size.

2. Reqn. G9/Malaya/195/2 (9 December 1963).

This required 510,000 Size G, 5,000 Size H2 and 9,000 Size K, with waxed paper interleaving. Delivery for Size K was requested by end-April 1964 with the rest by June 1964. Design to be as Reqn. G9/140/2. This was a Free-on-Board order to be shipped in conjunction with CA Dept. S3. 519,500 Size G were shipped on 26 February 1964. 5000 Size H2 and 9000 Size K were shipped on 27 April 1964. 20 Specimens of the H2 and K envelopes were also shipped.

3. Reqn. G&P/Malaya/4/90801/1 (13 January 1965).

This required 225,000 Size G (increased to 275,000 on 1 March 1965), with waxed paper interleaving, for delivery by 23 April 1965 at the latest. Design to be as Reqn. G9/195/2. This was a Free-on-Board order to be shipped in conjunction with CA Dept. S3. 278,500 were shipped on 22 April 1965 on Ben Line SS "Benavon" (incorrectly recorded as Denavon), followed by the balance on 20 July 1965.

First day facilities:

No first day facilities were provided and the issue date was not recorded.

Postal Rate Increase:

The 16 November 1964 postal rate increase raised the basic postage rate for local mail to 15c., as a consequence of which a 5c. stamp had to be affixed by the counter clerk and the sale price raised accordingly.

The status of this envelope is unknown. Although uprated with a Kelantan 5c. stamp, it appears to be an essay, possibly demonstrating the proposed embossing die on a stock McCorquodale envelope intended for the United Kingdom. It is known that the change to Malay text was planned before the change to the embossed die, so any bulk printing in English would be highly improbable. It may have been an unadopted essay used for uprating trials.



3.4. AEROGRAMMES.

25c. & 30c. Aerogrammes - Type 1 - Monolingual Ribbon.

At this time, there was a wide variety of postal rates for "light air letters". Two values of aerogramme were issued to cover the two lowest postal rates to, by way of example, Australia and India (25c) and to United Kingdom (30c). Higher rates (up to 50c) were achieved by the addition of postage stamps.

Design:

In both cases, the design of the relevant Federal definitive stamp was reproduced on the aerogramme (format A, 121mm x 102mm folded, 255mm x 213mm unfolded, with white-gummed tabs). The design was similar to Type C of the 1948 unstamped aerogrammes, which are sometimes seen used with the stamps of this definitive issue.

In the case of the **25c. aerogramme**, the "stamp" was reproduced at the top right of the front in deep blue-black and carmine on a white sheet overlaid on the face side in light (grey) blue. The shade of the overlay varied within the order. The "stamp" had perforation simulated by omitted the blue printing in the area of the "stamp". At the top left, there was a narrow curved ribbon bearing "BY AIR MAIL" above three lines reading "PAR AVION / AIR LETTER / AEROGRAMME" The text was in dark (slate) blue. There were five lines of dots for the address.

On the back, there were three lines for the Sender's name and address followed by three lines of instructions 85-86mm long reading "AN AIR LETTER SHOULD NOT CONTAIN / ANY ENCLOSURE; IF IT DOES IT WILL BE / SURCHARGED OR SENT BY ORDINARY MAIL". An example has been seen with an irregular scratch through the full length of the first line of text.

The **30c. aerogramme** had text and markings as above but printed in maroon. The "stamp", printed in the correct colours, had its perforation simulated by omitted the blue overlay in the area of the "stamp". The stamp background was lined, as on the issued definitive stamp. Once again, the paper overall printed colours vary. The first printing had a light lavender-blue unscreened background without white spaces for tabs.

In general, the Type 1 aerogrammes could be distinguished from the later Type 2 by the following features:

1. The space for attachment of the tabs to the back of the folded aerogramme had not been cleared of overlay and was indistinguishable from the rest of the sheet.

2. In the three line text "AN AIR LETTER SHOULD NOT CONTAIN / ANY ENCLOSURE; IF IT DOES IT WILL BE / SURCHARGED OR SENT BY ORDINARY MAIL", the I of IF was below the left hand leg of the H of SHOULD. The text was generally lighter than on later printings.

3. The "stamp" reproduced the engraving lines of the original stamps.

4. The simulated perforations were flattened off as they would be on a perforated stamp and measured 13.2×12.9 (25c.), 12.9×13.2 (30c.).

Variety:

Type 1a: Some pale greenish grey examples of the 30c. (seen mint and used between 3 April 1959 and 5 September 1963) had coarse (50 dots per inch) diamond-mesh screened overall printing, without white spaces for tabs, unlike all other examples which had flat (mottled when magnified) overall printing. The screening around the "stamp" was denser, making the simulated perforations, which measured 13.1 x 13.3, stand out in a three-dimensional effect. The stamp and inscriptions were identical to the original version, suggesting that the same artwork was used for both printings. No separate requisition exists for this version, but the size of the order may have resulted in more than one press or more than one printer, using different processes, being used to produce the number required (see also the first requisition below).

Requisition History:

There was only one Requisition for this version.

1. Reqn. G9/5575/4 (1956?).

This requested De La Rue to supply free-on-board 1,500,000 25c. and 1,000,000 30c. aerogrammes, banded in 100s, tied in 500s with tape and bundled in 2000s with strawboard at top and bottom, plus 370 additional "specimens" to be supplied to CI. Shipping was by S3 (the Crown Agents Shipping Department). The printer was required to supply complete proofs before commencing the print run to demonstrate the stamp, text and opacity of the paper. A 25c. proof on cream paper with slate blue overlay with monolingual ribbon was approved by "DBJ" but was undated. A 30c. proof on cream paper with dull blue overlay with monolingual ribbon was also approved by "DBJ" but was also undated. Both the above are assumed to be associated with this order.

The Crown Agents record books are silent as to the shipping date and quantities actually supplied. This usually indicates that the order was sub-contracted due to lack of capacity and this is believed to have occurred in this instance. An order of this magnitude was probably produced over an extended period and shipped in several batches, which would account for the colour variations that have been recorded. It was suggested by the late Ian Raybould that the sub-contractor may have been Harrison or Dickinson and they may have been shipped in September 1957, but this cannot be verified as the relevant records have been destroyed. The author suspects that Dickinson may have been responsible for part of the order, but the Type 1a screened background is not typical of their products, nor of any other aerogrammes examined. Two printers may have been involved, using artwork supplied by De La Rue, but using different production processes (see "Dies and plates" below).

Dies and plates

The Die and Plate Register records original material for two different printing processes, but they cannot be linked to specific requisitions or designs.

1. Rotary Printing:

For each value, there were three negatives: one for the wording, one for the vignette and one for the duty border. 1set cylinders were produced: 25c.: two tint cylinders, three vignette cylinders and four text cylinders; 30c.: two tint, two vignette and 2 text. Given the relative scarcity of 30c. Type 1a, it is suggested that this may have been the process involved, although no similar 25c. has been seen by the author. ⁴³

2. Lithographic Printing:

There were two 25c. wording negatives, one negative and one positive 25c. vignette, one negative and one positive 25c. border and wording, one negative and one positive 25c. frame, one negative and one positive 25c. wording, one valueless frame positive, one negative and one positive overlay and words, three positive and one negative 30c. tints, two negative and two positive 30c. wording and stamps, one positive 30c. stamp and vignette, one positive 30c. border and wording, one frame negative, two 12-set lithographic tint plates, one 12-set 25c. border lithographic plate, one 12-set 25c. vignette lithographic plate, one 12-set 30c. border lithographic plate.

All the above were destroyed on 20 May 1966.

There was no new issue facility for this envelope.

The would appear to have been a change of sub-contractor circa 1960, resulting in a product that was outwardly similar but significantly different in detail.

Design:

In general, the Type 2 aerogrammes from this requisition follow the overall layout of the Type 1 but are immediately recognisable with experience. They can be distinguished by the following features:

1. The space for attachment of the tabs to the back of the folded aerogramme have been cleared of overlay and show as "white" (paper coloured) spaces (as illustrated below on Type 3).

2. In the three line text "AN AIR LETTER SHOULD NOT CONTAIN / ANY ENCLOSURE; IF IT DOES IT WILL BE / SURCHARGED OR SENT BY ORDINARY MAIL", the I of IF lies below the right hand leg of the H of SHOULD. The text was generally bolder than on earlier printings.

3. The "stamp" was uniformly composed of dotted shading, instead of reproducing the engraving lines of the original stamps as in Type I, and was generally lighter in appearance than the earlier design.

4. The simulated perforations are pointed as in a die-cut, instead of flattened off as they would be on a perforated stamp, and measured $13.4 \times 13.0 (25c.)$, $13.0 \times 13.3 (30c.)$.

The stamp on the **25c. aerogramme**, especially the vignette, appears very light in colour compared with the first issue. The lettering was bolder and a more intense blue, which, together with the deep (grey) blue background, appears to be a glossy ink, giving a similar effect to chalk-surfaced paper. Unlike the original issue, the space where the tabs were to be affixed were left blank. It has been seen used between 8 May 1961 and 5 September 1961.

The **30c.** version has a similar chalky-surfaced appearance, a mottled background with white space for tabs and a "stamp" in

very pale colours. This design comes in various colours, including grey-blue (seen used 16 May 1961), blue (undated) and greenish blue (seen used 13 March 1962 to 5 January 1964).

Variety:

The 30c. was listed by Kessler (7a) with the orange centre omitted.

Requisition History:

There was only one Requisition for this version.

2. Reqn. G9/3079/2 (1959)

This Requisition, probably placed in the summer of 1959 from its numerical sequence, called for one million of each value from De La Rue. It was a Free-on-Board order, "Shipment to be effected in conjunction with (S3). On completion of contract, printing material to be handed to G9(CB) who will also supervise destruction of waste".

First day facilities:

No first day facilities were provided and the issue date was not recorded. Although no formal release was announced, it was reported that the aerogrammes appeared in post offices in October 1960. ⁴⁴ However, a cancelled-to-order copy of the 25c. exists cancelled in Jelutong, Penang on 8 May 1961, which suggests that this may have been the local date of issue. The earliest used example seen by the author was dated 13 May 1961.

3. Reqn. G9/5750/1 (1960).

This requisition, placed in 1960 and primarily concerned with registration envelopes, called for one million of the 25c. value only, packed in 100s, bundled in 200s and tied in 500s with tape and with boards top and bottom. Again the order was annotated "FoB Ship in conjunction with CA Shipping Dept (S3)". A photographic proof for the 25c., in which the stamp was replaced by a black box with a superimposed white "perforated stamp" and black guide lines, was approved by the Crown Agents Inspector of Stamps, R Ferne, on 13 January 1961. An undated, approved coloured proof of the 25c. on cream paper with light dull blue overlay and bilingual ribbon exists in the British Library collection with a dark blue-grey mottled overlay and white tab spaces as on the 1960 issue and this version was subsequently issued.

4. Reqn. G9/7520/2 (1961?).

This was a repeat of the previous order, but packed in 100s, bundled in 500s and tied in 2000s with tape and with boards top and bottom. The most likely dispatch date was in the first quarter of 1962.

First day facilities:

No first day facilities were provided and the issue date was not recorded. The earliest example seen by the author was used from Penang on 20 March 1962.

Notes: Kessler listed the above as 8 and 8a respectively. Although none was ordered, a 30c. bilingual ribbon version was listed by H&G as F8, by ISC as AL5 and by Kessler as 9. There was no evidence to support the existence of such an aerogramme.

Subsequent Requisitions are not contained in the Crown Agents Requisition books, but some information is available in the British Postal Museum and Archive record Post 52/704, which was a series of inspections carried out by the British Post Office at McCorquodale on behalf of the Crown Agents.

Unissued.

30c. Aerogramme - Seagull Box.

By 1962, the aerogramme rate was standardised on 30c. The 25c aerogramme therefore became redundant.

A Format A essay on azure blue unwatermarked paper was submitted to the Crown Agents Inspector of Stamps, R. Ferne, on 20 March 1963 with English text and a large rectangular box at top left showing the seagull airmail emblem

30c. Aerogramme - Type 4 - Seagull Ribbon.



The contract for aerogrammes passed from De La Rue to McCorquodale in 1963.

Design:

The 30c. design was revised with a broader "ribbon", bearing a seagull and "MEL UDARA / PAR AVION" above "SURAT UDARA / AIR LETTER / AEROGRAMME" in maroon. The "stamp" was now reproduced in "lined" form in maroon and orange on light blue paper. The "stamp" was printed on a white rectangle edged by a simulated perforation (14.8).

Varieties:

The second fold dotted line could be found in two positions. The normal (Type 4a) had the line ending opposite "di" of "lipat di-sini" in the first fold instructions (13mm between bottom address line and fold line). The variety (Type 4b) had it ending opposite the "t" of "lipat" (15mm between bottom address line and fold line). ⁴⁵

Misprinted varieties exist with the stamp not in register with the blank space left for it in the blue background. On these examples, the lake and orange colours were printed in register with each other but out of register with the background. When the sheets were cut, the cutting appears to have been in register with the background, not the stamp. The displacement was substantial on the examples seen (both being Type 4a). The stamp colours were displaced 6mm up on one example, and 2mm down and 2mm right on the other.

Requisition History:

Known requisitions are listed below. There may have been an earlier one which led to the Seagull Box essay and included specimens. This would also explain the early date on the CTO example described above.

5. Reqn. G9/Malaya/195/3 (9 December 1963).

This required McCorquodale to print 1,400,000 30c. airletters. 480,000 were shipped on 27 April 1964 followed by 990,000 and 6 Specimens on 10 June 1964 on Ben Line SS "Benvorlich".

6. Reqn. G&P/Malaya/4/90801/1 (13 January 1965).

This required McCorquodale to print 910,000 (increased 1 March 1965 to 1,410,000) 30c. airletters, banded in 100s, tied with string in 500s and wrapped in 2000s with strawboard at top and bottom, for delivery by 23 April 1965 at the latest. The size was specified as 10 1/8" x 8 3/8". It was to be printed on "Imperial Blue Airmail" paper with a reproduction of the 30c. Map stamp. In was a free-on-board order to be shipped in conjunction with CA Dept. S3. 1,582,000 were shipped on 22 April 1965 on Ben Line SS "Benavon" (incorrectly recorded as Denavon).

First day facilities:

No first day facilities were provided and the issue date was not recorded. A CTO example addressed to an eminent dealer in Penang suggests that the issue date was 7 March 1964 in West Malaysia (but it had not been shipped by then). Both types exist cancelled-to-order on 7 May 1964. It was not reported in Sarawak until August 1964. ⁴⁶. The earliest commercially used example seen by the author was dated 12 February 1965.

The monolingual aerogramme, but with text laid out as for Type 3, was used as the basis for an official aerogrammes. The stamp was omitted and replaced by the text "ON GOVERNMENT SERVICE" in black. The example seen was printed for use by the Central Accounts Office of the Director of Posts (Finance), Kuala Lumpur and used on 27 May 1965 on Post Office Stamp Bureau business, but must have been printed at a much earlier date. It had no watermark. ⁴⁷

Official Aerogrammes - Bilingual Ribbon.

The bilingual aerogramme was used as the basis for a series of official aerogrammes as follows:

Type O1 (c.1963):

"ON GOVERNMENT SERVICE" in a single 59mm line in place of the stamp and an italic script address for the Director of Posts (Finance) on the back. The standard aerogramme emblem and text was printed in royal blue on light blue paper. The paper, manufactured by Wiggins, Teape & Co. Ltd., was watermarked with the paper maker's watermark "IMPERIAL / (castle gateway) / (year letter) / AIRMAIL", the first line being curved over the castle. These were only known used with a red Official Paid postmark. The year letter indicated the year of manufacture of the paper, K (1957), M (1959) and O (1960) having been reported.

Notes: The earliest use date reported was 21 January 1965 at Kuala Lumpur.

Federation of Malaya

Type O2 (c.1964):

"<u>ON POSTAL SERVICE</u>" in a single 47mm line in place of the stamp. The Director of Posts (Finance) address again appeared but this time in block letters. Examples were known used between 21 January 1965 and 15 September 1969. These were only known used with a red Official Paid postmark.

Notes: Kessler gave the line length as 43mm and watermark C (1950), which was almost certainly an erroneous observation of O.

Type O3 (c.196?):


Later reprints were reported by Kessler to have had 42mm inscription and watermark O.

Type O4 (c.1966):

Later reprints were reported by Kessler to have had 41mm inscription and watermark O (used in 1966).

Type O5 (c.1967):

The bilingual aerogramme with watermark K was again used c.1967 with "<u>ON POSTAL SERVICE</u>" in a single 38½mm line in place of the stamp. The Director of Posts (Finance) address was in italic letters. Examples have been reported used between 1967 ⁴⁸ and 1 February 1968 ⁴⁹.
