CHAPTER SEVENTY-FIVE

OFFICIAL POSTAL STATIONERY.

[Unless otherwise stated, illustrations of stationery are reduced by 50%]

Official postal stationery falls into two categories:

- Official stationery that has been specially printed for postal use. Most of this falls into the heading of routine business stationery and has not been studied sufficiently to enable a listing in this book.
- Ordinary postal stationery (usually redundant postcards or envelopes, including first day covers) that has been handstamped or overprinted for official use.

Where items are derived from or closely related to issues covered in this book, the official versions are listed with the original issue and can be located using Index 2 and/or Index 3. The listing below records other items which are known to have been in official use since 1948.

1950. Correspondence reply card
Overprints on 1937 Straits Settlements Definitive Issue - 2c. Orange Postcard.





The Straits Settlements 2c. orange postcard was only released in 1941, shortly before the fall of Malaya, following a change of postal rates. Considerable stocks survived the Japanese Occupation to the end of the war and initially some were invalidated by the application of a partial postmark of Benta, Pahang. Another portion of the stock was subsequently revalued by the application of 4c. in British Military Administration (BMA) stamps (two 2c.) for provisional use. Once adequate stocks of 4c. BMA cards were available, this process ceased.

Another portion of remaindered stocks of the 2c. orange postcard was overprinted at the Kuala Lumpur Postal Services Department printing office with "ON POSTAL SERVICE" plus horizontal lines over the text (2 lines), coat of arms (7 lines) and stamp imprint (11 lines) on the face, under an order placed on 15 June 1950. The back was overprinted with a form to acknowledge correspondence received by the Chief Accountant (later amended by purple handstamp to "Director of Posts (Finance)". They were designated as form Posts - Misc.29. The order was for 1000 cards, witnessed by the imprint "83-1000-15-6-50-P.S.Dept.Press, K.L." (although other redundant stock could conceivably have been included, such as older Straits Settlements cards or cards from the Malay States, no such items have been recorded).

The card is known used between 5 September 1955 and 2 March 1961, but it must have been available for use much earlier.

1971. Filing card
Overprints on 1937 Straits Settlements Definitive Issue - 2c. Orange Postcard.

Another portion of remaindered stocks of the 2c. orange postcard received the A1 handstamp and C1 overprint as applied to remaindered 1948 Definitive Issue stationery and described in Chapter 8 (see issue 48D.31). The order imprint has not been confirmed, but this card is believed to come from the same printing order as the 1948 Definitive Issue examples.

Another portion of remaindered stocks of the Perak 2c. orange postcard received horizontal lines over the bottom line of text (3 lines, the middle one being narrow) and the stamp imprint (11 broad lines plus a narrow line at bottom - 12 in total). The correspondence side was ruled as a meter reading record card. There was no printing imprint, so the order date and quantity are unknown. The only example seen was unused.

Remaindered stocks of the 1941 2c. orange Perak and Selangor postcards were overprinted circa 1953, probably at the Kuala Lumpur Postal Services Department printing office, with "**ON POSTAL SERVICE**" plus horizontal lines over the bottom line of text (4 lines) and the stamp imprint (11 broad lines plus a narrow line at bottom - 12 in total).

They were intended for following-up queries regarding money orders between Central Accounts Office and customers or other postmasters. The card does not bear a printing imprint, so order date and quantities are unknown, but used examples appear to be earlier than those bearing the 1953 imprint (see below). Known used on 20 May 1954 (Perak card) or 22 November 1955 (Selangor card) from the Director of Posts to "The Superintendent, Foreign Post Division, Calcutta".

Further remaindered stocks of the 1941 2c. orange Perak postcard were overprinted at the Kuala Lumpur Postal Services Department printing office with "**ON POSTAL SERVICE**" plus horizontal lines over the bottom line of text (4 lines) and the stamp imprint (12 broad lines plus narrow lines at top and bottom - 14 in total).


The correspondence side was identical to the preceding printing. The order placed on 3 October 1953 was for 2000 cards, witnessed by the imprint "183-2000-3.10.53-P.S.Dept. Press. K.L." (other redundant stock could have been included). It is known used between 10 September 1956 and 8 February 1960 from the Director of Posts to "The Superintendent, Foreign Post Division, Calcutta", but it must have been available for use much earlier.

Remittance receipt Overprints on 1938 Perak Definitive Issue - 2c. Orange Postcard.





Remaindered stocks of the 1941 2c. orange Perak postcard were similarly overprinted at the Kuala Lumpur Postal Services Department printing office with "<u>ON POSTAL SERVICE</u>" plus horizontal lines over the two lines of text (4 lines each) and the stamp imprint (13 lines).

Intended for receipt of remittances between postmasters and Postal Headquarters, they were designated as form "Posts - Accts. 8B". The order placed on 22 January 1955 was for 40,000 cards, witnessed by the imprint "24-40,000-22-1-55-P.S.Dept. Press. K.L." (although other redundant stock could conceivably have been included, such as older Straits Settlements cards or cards from the Malay States, no such items have been recorded). Known used 8 January 1957, but it must have been available for use much earlier.

Johore used a series of 128mm x 102mm Official Post Cards, given form number T.B.16. ² These usually appeared with printed rate demand messages, completed in manuscript, and often with additional form numbers relating to the use to which they are being put. The basic card had the form number at top right and heading "POST (crest) CARD" above a single line of Jawi script text. The size of the text and crest varied. Below three dotted lines for the addressee, there was a proforma for the rate demand and a signature block, usually complete with a rubber stamp. The reverse of the card had a six-line form letter in Jawi. The card had to be produced when paying the rates bill, so it is unlikely that many survived. Recorded cards were:

1958-1961.

1948 Definitive Issue - Official Overprinted Stationery.

In 1958-1961, the 1948 Definitive Issue envelopes and postcards were used as official stationery, with the "stamp" and text overprinted with bars and "ON POSTAL SERVICE" or "ON GOVERNMENT SERVICE". See Chapter 8 for further information.

1960.

1957 Definitive Issue - Official Envelope.

In 1960, the 1957 Definitive Issue envelope was used as an official envelope, with the "stamp" overprinted with bars and "URUSAN POS". See Chapter 9 for further information.

1963-1964.

1957 Definitive Issue - Official Aerogramme.

In 1963-1964, the 1957 Definitive Issue aerogramme was used as the basis for two series of official aerogrammes, with the "stamp" omitted and "ON GOVERNMENT SERVICE" or "ON POSTAL SERVICE" substituted. See Chapter 9 for further information.

1965-date.

Official Use of First Day Covers.

Surplus first day covers are frequently used for official correspondence between postmasters. These covers are found struck with a wide variety of violet handstamps. See the relevant stamp issue for details of any known usage.

1992-1993.

Official Postal Stationery.

The official envelopes used by the Postal Services Department of Malaya and its Malaysian successor, and by Pos Malaysia, is largely virgin territory for future researchers. However, the following information appeared in The Malayan Philatelist and is repeated for future reference. The first "POS Malaysia" envelope to appear was a white C5 envelope, bearing the new emblem at top left with "<u>URUSAN POS</u>" in blue at the top centre of the envelope. This C5 size Urusan Pos envelope was later revised to include the Philatelic Bureau address (in Bahasa) to the right of the Pos Malaysia emblem. This version was first seen with the 24 June 1993 new issue mailing. There was no printer's imprint.

1994-1999.

Official Use of Commemorative Postal Stationery Envelopes.

Surplus postal stationery envelopes are also known used for official correspondence. These covers are found overprinted with "URUSAN POS" and an "X" across the "stamp". See the relevant envelope for details of any such known use.
